

Children use **SMART** rules in school:
S - Keep **safe** by being careful not to give out personal information (such as, name, email address, phone number, home address or school name) to people who you don't trust online.

M - **Meeting** someone you have only been in touch with online can be dangerous. Only do so with your parents' or carers' permission, and even then only when they go with you.

A - **Accepting** emails, IM messages or opening files, pictures or texts from people you don't know or trust can lead to problems. They may contain viruses or nasty messages.

R - Someone online may be lying about who they are and information you find on the internet may not be **reliable**.

Parental control on electronic devices
